New Frontier is a program for 50 at-risk students at Millard South High School in Omaha, Nebraska. The focus of the program is two-fold: we want the students to succeed academically and socially. Given those goals, we teach social skills every day.

In the spring of 2006, New Frontier had the opportunity to experience Youth Frontier's Respect Retreat. It was a wonderful day for the students as well as for the teachers. The students participated in many small-group activities that focused on building trust and respect. They were fun activities; initially, our students didn't always make the connection between what they were doing and why they were doing it. However, later, when they processed with the leaders in small discussion groups, it all became clear. It was interesting for us teachers to observe – and that is all the teachers did. Youth Frontiers' leaders did it all.

The final activity of the day was the most impressive. It was called the "Campfire." The lights were dimmed and a candle was lit. The students were invited to share their insights and feelings. They were encouraged to focus on positive qualities of others and to apologize if they could think of times they had been less than respectful toward someone in the group. We teachers could hardly believe what these kids shared – beautiful, sincere expressions of thankfulness, apologies, and positive statements!! By the end of the campfire activity, many of us had tears in our eyes.

As a teacher and an administrator, we appreciated the organization of the day. The Youth Frontiers staff really knows what they are doing. It was easy to communicate with the group to prepare for the day and all Youth Frontiers staff members were very professional. It was a wonderful day, and a day that the students talked about for the rest of the year.
