Preparation Checklist

To prepare for your Youth Frontiers Leadership Conference (YFLC), please complete each item on the checklist. If you have questions, call us at 952.922.0222. Please note that a staff member from your school is required to attend with your students. We're honored to be working with you.

Return your signed contract and payment within 10 business days.
Confirm your 20 student participants. If you haven't provided their names to us yet, please email info@youthfrontiers.org.
Determine student transportation to the retreat. (Schools have found success using vans, small buses, carpools or sharing a bus with another participating school.)
Have students complete the online survey at least two weeks prior to the retreat. Access the survey at youthfrontiers.org/pre-yflc-survey. (Students will also fill out a survey after the YFLC to measure the impact of the day.)
Inform teachers, counselors and staff about your retreat.
Inform parents about your retreat.



Leadership Conference Overview

The Youth Frontiers Leadership Conference (YFLC) runs **four hours** in length. For the highest quality retreat experience, we recommend this retreat for students who show leadership abilities, have been selected by school staff as leaders and/or have opted in for this motivational experience. Every YFLC includes the following dynamic mix of activities designed to have the greatest impact on participants:



We welcome students with music and high-energy activities that break down social barriers and encourage connection with students from other participating schools.



PRESENTATIONS

Programs Staff will give a talk and share original music challenging students to accept personal and ethical responsibility for fostering a positive school community where everyone can thrive.



SMALL GROUPS

Students will meet in small groups with participants from other schools. They will have the opportunity to further discuss the ideas shared in the large-group presentation.



LUNCH

We will provide lunch for all students and staff. We will also gather staff to have meaningful conversations about character development and socialemotional learning.



REFLECTION

Students will have time for personal journaling and reflection to determine an action plan and the first step to solving a problem they see at school.



SHARING

The closing is an opportunity for students to share their action plans. Each student will make a commitment to take responsibility and be a leader in a specific way at their school.

Day-of Details

Sharing

During both small-group conversations and large-group sharing, students will be asked to refer to their own experiences at school. During large-group sharing, our staff will create expectations for your students regarding what is appropriate to share. The students will be encouraged to share in front of their peers one thing they will do to help build a positive school culture.

At the end of the YFLC, there will be time for students to share some thoughts and reflections from the day. Our staff will set expectations for the students that this should be a time for them to share a commitment to make their school a better.

Occasionally, students may bring up emotional or personal experiences. To ensure appropriate sharing, our staff will redirect students, when necessary, to stay within proper boundaries. We recommend that you have a counselor or mental health professional present at the retreat in the event that a student requires further support.

If, during any part of the retreat, a YF staff member is made aware of a student referring to wanting to hurt themself or someone else, our staff will document the incident and relay it to one of your staff, ideally a counselor or school psychologist.

Staff Expectations

- Attend the staff meeting.
- **Be present** with the students during the largegroup activities and topic-based talk.
- Participate in activities as they feel comfortable.
- Assist with any behavior corrections or disciplinary problems as needed.
- Help distribute snack, lunch and retreat materials as needed.



Participation Benefits

Teachers/staff will better understand the language of the retreat, enabling them to reinforce those lessons in the classroom.

The retreat experience builds community.

Teachers have told us that the retreat gives them a chance to see students in a different light, and many students say the same about their teachers.

At the end of the retreat, students will walk away with tangible ideas to implement positive change. This is a great chance for school staff to partner with, support and guide these leaders. Please encourage school staff and administrators to attend.

The values we discuss are timeless and everyone can benefit from this experience.
